The "Do You Know?" scale developed by Marshall Duke and Robyn Fivush asks questions about family history. For example, one of the questions is "Do you know how your parents met? Or another question asks, do you know the source of your name?" There are twenty questions in all. The more yes answers the person chooses, the better the person knows his/her family stories. Studies show that young people who knew stories from their families show a higher well-being in a variety of indicators including self-esteem, academic competence, levels of anxiety, social competence, and general behavior. Knowing family stories meant a child had spent extended periods of time listening and talking with parents, grand-parents, or other members of their family.

According to Duke and Fivush, there are three kinds of family narratives: ascending stories (rags to riches: pulling yourself up by your boot straps), descending stories (failure and misfortune: Once upon a time we were on the top of the world and then we lost everything) and stories that oscillate (stories of resiliency: We had good times and bad times, but through it all we stuck together). The last kind of story telling offers the greatest strength to a child. These kinds of stories help children develop the intergenerational self that builds the kind of spirit that allows someone to move forward despite varying circumstances.

On April 6th and 7th, author Mark Yaconelli will be visiting Countryside Christian Church to talk about the importance of storytelling. In fact, his book is entitled, "Between the Listening and the Telling, How Stories Can Save Us." Storytelling and listening are different sides of the same coin.

We will be hosting a family night on Saturday, April 6th, from 6 pm to 8pm where Mark will be talking about how storytelling in families (even church families) improves children's wellbeing overall. Families including children are invited to come, have pizza, and join us in learning about and practicing storytelling and listening skills.

In addition, on Sunday morning, Mark will be with us speaking during worship at 10:15 and then we will follow worship with lunch and an interactive session that allows adults to continue delving deeper into the importance of storytelling, how storytelling can be a spiritual practice and how sharing and hearing each other stories help us grow into community.

In his book, Yaconelli says, "at this moment, it is possible to feed every human being. It is possible to house every human being. It is possible to heal the suffering of every neglected child. It is possible to create a just society. It is possible to heal the environment. To do these things, we have to overcome what philosopher Charles Eisenstein calls the most damaging story in the world: "we are separate." (84) Come and join us on April 6th and 7th as we explore storytelling and discover how stories can save us. PS. I had a great conversation with Mark this past week and told him what our community has been experiencing in the past 15 months including surviving a tornado just a few weeks ago. Mark employs the art of storytelling to help people talk about the hard things that they have experienced and survived. He will be bringing his book, "The Gift of Hard Things: Finding Grace in Unexpected Place with him when he joins us the first weekend in April. (*Continued on page 7*)

### **Financial Report**

The amount of weekly offering received for February is listed below. For February, our current income came in slightly ahead of our budgeted income with a total monthly income of \$16,233 and our budget was \$13,511, so we brought in \$2,722 more than our budget. We would also like to continue highlighting the Givelify electronic giving app as we received \$5,877 of income in February, which is a very solid month of giving through this app. If you recall, we started using the Givelify app back in April 2020 and we have received a total of \$208,379 in giving over the last three plus (3+) years using this app so it has been a major factor in terms of a giving tool for our church. Overall, we met our budgeted giving for February and have been able to maintain a positive current balance so that is a blessing for our church. We would like to continue to highlight that 70% of our current expenses go towards the personnel / staffing / programming costs of the church in terms of salaries (and benefits) so it is critical that we receive consistent weekly / monthly contributions to provide the salaries to our Ministry staff as they do an awesome job for our church!

Sweet Dreams – As mentioned during our recent worship service, Countryside Christian Church has become a primary sponsor for the continuation of this awesome program in our community. The Church received \$7,000 in funding from the former sponsoring group and received another \$2,350 in donations in February for a total of \$9,350 in funding. We are excited to continue moving this program forward in the community under the guidance and direction of Aaron Anderson and thank Jason Knasinki for his vision in founding this outreach program.



### **God's Grace by Larry Preston**

Is God done with you yet? If you are reading this, the answer is no. On March 14th at 7:00 pm, Deb and I were watching "Wheel of Fortune" on TV as we normally do. Channel 13 broke in with a weather alert. For the next hour and 10 minutes we watched attentively as Delaware and Randolph County moved under a tornado warning. Around 8 pm, the weather person warned there would be severe weather in Muncie, then Selma, Parker City then Farmland, then, Winchester. Around 8:10 we lost electricity. Our son's dog was with us (who is scared of storms), came

into the living room with us. Deb heard the tornado sirens around 8:20 so it was time to take cover. We went to our closet in the master bedroom under a stairway. Deb stepped in the closet and I had one foot in when we felt our house raise up and twist around. In a matter of seconds, Deb and I grabbed each other and we were slammed to the ground. Deb laid on her back and I ended up directly on top of her. We tried to move, but we were unsuccessful because the whole house had collapsed down on us. Deb had managed to hang onto her cell phone. And for an hour we tried to call 911 and everyone we knew but there was no service. Our brother and sister-in-law, Randy and Judy Keys live directly north of us and sensed there was something wrong and came up our back drive. Randy hollered out, "are you okay?". We told him we could not move. He told Deb to hang on and that it would be awhile because the whole house was on top of us. Our good friend and law officer Ken Hendrickson showed up and assured Deb and I that they would get us out. Shortly after that, we got a call from 911 to come in, maybe from Delaware County? They transferred us to the Randolph County 911 line with Angela Resler. She assured us help was on the way and she would stay on the line until they got there. We have seen videos and there were fire departments, EMTs, Heavy Equipment Operators, Rescue Workers, as far as you could see, all there for us. After two or three hours, of digging, saving and removing debris, they pulled Deb out, then myself. Deb spent a couple of days at Reid Hospital and I spent half a day at Miami Valley Hospital. We were scraped after being buried from head to toe but no broken bones. A special thank you to Mark Moody for helping secure some rescue equipment, too. The outpouring of support from our church, the community and our friends has been overwhelming and humbling. If you want to talk numbers, like the Bible does, we have a 5 bedroom home, 5 out buildings and 5 vehicles. We lost them all. But Deb and I and the trinity (5) still remains.
